The oldest and most famous national park in the west is **Yellowstone**, with almost 3500 square miles of wilderness. It is known for its impressive geothermal hot springs and spurting geysers as well as the beautiful landscape and abundant wildlife such as bears, wolves, bison, elk, and antelope. **Yosemite National Park** in California is among the most visited parks in the country. With splendid valleys revealing waterfalls, impressive granite rocks, hiking trails for all levels and ages, and scenic drives, it offers enough adventure to suit everyone.

Often overlooked, the **Channel Islands National Park** offers peace and solitude for a day trip, with the possibility of seeing species found nowhere else in the world. Further north in Washington, **Olympic National Park** is great for exploring rivers, lakes, coastline, with opportunities for hiking, fishing, wildlife viewing and tide pooling. The striking landscape of **Grand Teton National Park** in Wyoming will leave you breathless. While it is popular for mountaineering, hiking, and fishing, visitors can enjoy boating on its lakes, wildlife viewing and scenic drives.

- Discover the many species of mammals living beneath the soaring peaks of the Teton Range
